Authorities investigating fatal stabbing in Milton

A person died after being stabbed in Milton Sunday night, according to Norfolk County District Attorney spokesman David Traub.

Traub said investigators with the district attorney's office remained at the scene of the apparent stabbing on Hudson Street as of 12:30 a.m. Monday.

The victim was taken to a local hospital and died there. Traub, citing a preliminary investigation, said the death is being treated as an "apparent homicide."

No further details were available.
