When the bombs went off on Monday, Ralton said he was handing o about a block and a half away. He tried to run toward the scene, but trampled by people heading away from the explosions. He stayed in t and tried to help out for as long as he could.

Standing beside him, Rev. Rathbone said some people stricken with g turned to the church's clergy for help and guidance, including a runn volunteer that she said she spoke with Tuesday.

"The runner didn't have any words, just tears," she said. "The volunte yet have tears, but I told him they were coming."
