Police make arrests in rash of Allston Brighton burglaries; ask

Police say they've made several arrests, confiscated dozens of expensive items, and have identified other possible suspects tied to a recent surge of burglaries around the Allston and Brighton neighborhoods.

Still, police are urging residents to be vigilant and to make sure they lock doors and windows and avoid leaving valuable items in plain sight.

"If you see something suspicious, call 911 or come down to the station to make a report," said Sergeant Michael C. O'Hara, who works in District D-14, which patrols Allston and Brighton.

Through April 1 of this year, 143 burglaries and attempted burglaries were reported in Allston-Brighton, which is more than twice the 61 burglaries and attempted burglaries that were reported during the same span last year.

"It's a crime of opportunity," O'Hara said. "Most of these breaking and entering happen because students leave their doors and windows open and unlocked."

The surge in burglaries in Allston-Brighton this year has come as the city of Boston has seen serious crimes, including burglaries, drop.

To try to combat the problem, Boston Police recently deployed members of the department's Special Investigations Unit to assist officers at District D-14, O'Hara said.

The unit has provided additional manpower and is also armed with additional resources and statistical data to help track crimes. The unit can also g

presented to the police, but they are not being collected because they are not the responsibility of the police.

He said in the short time since the arrests, the reports of burglaries have increased slightly but that police won't know the full impact of the arrests for several months.

The Special Investigations Unit is currently in District D-14.

Police have several other "programs of interest" they are conducting, including one where they have been focusing on burglaries in the area.

O'Hara said his program's success will be measured in how many burglaries are prevented or solved. He said he is also looking for ways to help the community, such as providing information on how to stay safe.
