

# Few Syrian refugees have made it to New England

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Since the conflict in Syria began four years ago, more than 4 million people have fled the country. But

only a handful have made it to the United States and even fewer have made it to New England.

While many of the refugees have <u>flocked to Europe</u>, nearly 2,000 have come to the United States, including 114 who have been <u>placed</u> in 13 different towns and cities across <u>New England</u>, according to records kept by the US Department of State's Refugee Processing Center.

Eleven of the Syrian refugees arrived last year; the remainder arrived this year.

The largest local host community of Syrian refugees is Worcester, where 25 have settled, followed by Springfield where 21 have been placed, the data shows. Next are: New Haven, Conn., with 19; and West Springfield, Mass., and Hartford, Conn., which each have 13 Syrian refugee placements.



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Only four Syrian refugees have been brought to Boston, according to the data. Another 19 are scattered across other New England cities: Beverly, Lowell, Tewksbury, Portland, Maine, Concord, N.H., and Bristol and West Haven, Conn.

None have been placed in Rhode Island or Vermont.

Syrians represent a small fraction — less than 1 percent — of the more than 16,500 refugees of all nationalities that have been placed in New England since 2011, the year the Syrian conflict began. But the pace has picked up: Syrians account for 7.5 percent of the 1,369 refugees placed in the region so far this year, the data shows.

The picture is similar nationally, with 1,996 Syrian refugees placed in the United States since 2011, compared with more than 312,500 refugees overall who have come here.


With worldwide concern over the refugees flooding out of the Middle East — and some European countries taking in huge numbers — the number of Syrian refugees settling here is expected to increase soon. The White House <u>said last month</u> that the United States will take in at least 10,000 during the next 12 months.
