

1 in 4 Americans are immigrants or children of immigrants

President Trump's order Friday to at least temporarily stop admitting refugees and immigrants from

certain countries sparked a passionate, vocal outcry.

There were many reasons cited for the criticism, including by people who called the move unjust, un-American, or unconstitutional, or worried that the strategy might ultimately backfire.

And, for many, it was personal.

It's likely that many people at least know someone who immigrated here or whose parents did. That's because more than one in four Americans are either the children of immigrants or immigrated to the United States themselves.

As of 2015, people born outside of this country accounted for 13.9 percent of the US population, while second-generation immigrants accounted for another 11.9 percent, according to data from the <u>Pew</u> Research Center.
