

South Hadley gives Sayer 2 more years on contract

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The South Hadley School Committee approved a two-year contract extension for School Superintendent Gus A. Sayer Thursday.

The two-year extension begins July 1. Sayer was hired as South Hadley's School Superintendent six years ago and earns \$125,141 annually. Any salary increases under the new contract extension must still be negotiated.

"I know it was a tough decision for the School Committee because they're under a lot of pressure from various groups, but they are responsible for the town as a whole," Sayer said, of the vote of support.

"There were certainly more questions this year than in previous years," he added.

School Committee members could not be reached Friday for comment.

Sayer's contract renewal comes at a turbulent time in the School Department. Some residents and others outside of town have called for his resignation in the wake of the School Department's handling of the high-profile case involving the late Phoebe Prince, a 15-year-old high school freshman.

Prince hanged herself at her home Jan. 14, and her story exploded onto the national stage in March when Northwestern District Attorney Elizabeth D. Scheibel brought criminal charges against six students in connection with her death.

Meantime, Sayer said he still hasn't met with Scheibel to discuss inconsistencies between her team's findings and those of a high school investigation.

Earlier this year, Scheibel suggested school officials could have done more to stop the students who harassed Prince and described "the actions or inactions" of some adults of the school as "troublesome."

School administrators say that until they meet with Scheibel, they won't know what she means.

Asked why he and South Hadley High School Principal Daniel T. Smith have not been able to meet with Scheibel after weeks of requests, Sayer said he didn't have an answer.

"We're still trying to meet with her," Sayer said. "We're available."

Resident Luke T. Gelinas, who has been an outspoken critic of school administrators, said he expected as much from the School Committee in regard to their vote to extend Sayer's contract. "It's typical of the lack of care and concern for our kids," said Gelinas in a phone interview Friday. "They're only concerned about themselves, their friends and the old-boy cronyism that got us all into this mess to begin with."

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Shame on them

Shame on South Hadley school board for keeping Sayer on. Not only is it a slap in the communities face, but to the children that are in that school system. Clearly, Mr. Sayer has not been forth coming on the issue of Bullying at the school. The residents of South Hadley should be outraged!

Thankfully school of choice is an option that can be exercised.

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
