Goddard House, state's oldest nursing home, a casualty of funding and changing times

183, Ellen Jones figured that she would spend the rest of her days at Goddard House. In her three years at the Jamaica Plain nursing home, the longtime Rowbury resident had made many good friends, and she had found romance. "I came to love him very much," she

But when Goddard House, the state's oldest elder-care center, an-

nounced last month that it would close in September, Jones was forced to move, leaving her friends and a place she knew as home.

"We were supposed to be here permanently," she said, shortly before she moved to a Dorchester facility. Her male companion has moved from Goddard to a facility in Medford, making it tough for them to see each other.

The wrenching news of Goddard's closing stunned the approximately 115 residents and their families and will cost 135 workers their jobs. But the demise of the 85-year-old facility, which needs an estimated \$10 million in reno-GODARA MOUSE, Page AB
