

"There's nothing to hide here," said Paul Kilgarriff, the club's lawyer and a longtime member. He believes the closure was carried out legitimately.

While appreciative of efforts to revive the club, he sees no scenario in which the building would open again. He expects the organization to dissolve once the building sells, though a sale might take months.

"The last thing we wanted to do was to close it down," said Kilgarriff, citing the club's worsening financial state, particularly the need to upgrade the firealarm system — a fix estimated at \$15,000, or half the club's remaining savings.

"If we stayed open, it would have closed within a matter of months anyway, but at that point it would be irresponsible," he said.

The club was founded in 1945 and originally met in rented space in Hibernian Hall in Roxbury. Thirty-three years later, the group purchased the West Roxbury building — a spacious former bowling alley.

Kilgarriff attributed the club's decline, in part, to a generational shift.

"The younger people really aren't interested in the kind of music played at the club and the type of dancing that goes on," he said. "On Saint Patrick's Day, they would rather go to an Irish bar in Boston. And that's fine, but they aren't coming to the Irish Social Club."

But others contend the club can be saved and believe not enough had been done in recent years to attract new members.

"There's a lot more support for this than I think the directors realized," said City Councilor Matt O'Malley, who represents the neighborhood and is working with Coppinger to save the club. "I think that there is perhaps an opportunity to relaunch the Social Club 2.0. . . . I think there's an opportunity for the club to thrive once again."

Officials and community members have proposed launching a fund-raising campaign and membership drives, replacing the fire alarms at reduced cost through donated labor, and adding programs to attract younger members.

Kathleen Adams, a 15-year member whose mother is also a member and whose father is a former president of the club, said that between current members and outside supporters, there are enough interested and motivated people to keep the club going.

"I understand if [the club's leadership] doesn't want to run it anymore," Adams said. "I just don't understand why they would want to close it when there are so many people around who want to keep it open."
